

JUSTICE STUDIES CAREER PATHS – School of Professional Studies

Cyber Security - Cybersecurity specialists help all types of organizations identify weaknesses in IT systems and suggest solutions to make these systems as secure as possible. They also design firewalls, monitor the use of data files, and regulate access to safeguard information and protect the network. Staying up-to-date on current virus reports and protecting networks from these viruses is a major aspect of a cybersecurity specialist's job.

Investigations and Security - The private security and investigation industry involves a range of roles, including private detectives, investigators, and security guards. Related careers include airport security, armored truck drivers, bodyguards, cryptographic technicians, directors of security, fire inspectors and investigators, forensic experts, internet security specialists, Secret Service Special Agents, security consultants, and other professions.

Law School - In addition to the many career opportunities that exist in the legal professions, many students hope to pursue a career practicing law as a corporate or private attorney. Attorneys work for all types of organizations as well as in private practice. To prepare for law school entrance exams, a number of elective courses provide an excellent foundation for the rigor of law school studies.

National Security - A main component of a homeland security specialist's job description is to protect local, state, and federal infrastructure in the event of disaster or terrorist attack. Homeland security specialists might also be trained in other primary fields, including law enforcement or emergency medical services.

The duties of a homeland security specialist involve developing programs that are intended to respond to emergencies, such as natural disasters, hazardous materials spills, or terrorist attacks on the country. They might interact and coordinate with other homeland security specialists at local, state, or federal levels to develop, maintain, or enhance emergency and terrorism response programs.

Policing - Police officers work for city or municipal police departments. Their job is to enforce laws; preserve peace; protect life and property; investigate crime; apprehend lawbreakers; and provide community service. Police officers also enforce traffic laws. Detectives and criminal investigators, who are sometimes called agents or special agents, gather facts and collect evidence of possible crimes. Possible careers in this field include police officer, crime specialist, detective, criminologist, emergency police dispatchers, and other positions.
